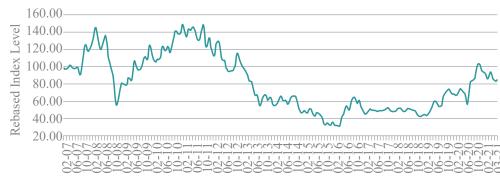

Portfolio Management's Commentary

Market Review

- During the month of March, Palladium was the only precious metal that had a positive return of 12.90%. Silver, Gold, and Platinum each had negative returns of -8.44%, -1.52%, and -0.47%, respectively.

 • Gold and precious metals equities, as measured by the S&P BMI Gold and Precious Metals Index (non-Sharia compliant), gained 3.73%
- during the period.
- Gold ETFs had net outflows of -4.33mm oz, or about -4.2% of total known gold ETFs.

Current Gold & Precious Metals Themes

Rising yields, strengthening USD continued to weigh

Gold and silver came under pressure during the month of March as a combination of rising yields and stronger USD continued to create headwinds for precious metals. Gold ETF liquidations continued apace, retreating from the all-time high levels seen in late 2020. After falling through the \$1,800/oz level gold prices seem to have settled into a new, lower range with dips to \$1,700/oz finding buyers. Thus far, prices seem trapped between a macro backdrop that remains supportive for gold (negative real rates and lingering macroeconomic risks) and a market that continues to price reflation and re-opening.

Palladium jumped during the month as flooding at two Norilsk Nickel mines halted production and added to a supply situation that was already tenuous after a roof collapse at one of the company's concentrators last month. The company estimates that lost supply could amount to over 500,000 ounces of palladium, equivalent to approximately 5% of global supply. The lost production exacerbates the tight supply situation for palladium, which was already expected to be in deficit this year.

Cyclical recovery offers opportunities outside of Gold. Gold miners expected to generate strong cash flow despite prices.

In the short-term, gold prices will likely require a new catalyst to break out of the recent range driven by real rates and USD movements. We mentioned last month that the recent rise in Silver prices would likely experience a correction after the short term interest fades, a scenario which materialized during February and continued into March. We continue to favor Platinum & Palladium (PGMs), which benefit from improving industrial & manufacturing activity. Palladium, in particular should draw support from tightening supply conditions as supply woes continue for the metal used in automotive emissions control devices. Overall, investor interest in Gold has taken a pause, and outperformance of base metals over precious metal continues to reflect investors' preference in assets benefiting from cyclical recovery. Against this backdrop, Gold is struggling to find support near the \$1,700/oz level. Looking ahead, in light of the most recent \$1.9 trillion stimulus package and with another massive \$2 trillion infrastructure proposal on deck, the Federal Reserve may have to walk a fine line to prevent the economy from over-heating. Should this scenario begin to materialize, we expect investors will consider adding Gold into their portfolios as a measure to hedge against sharp rises in inflation.

We continue to favor diamond miners given an improving fundamental supply-demand balance. Alrosa, one of the world's largest producers reported sales for March that were lower sequentially, with management stating that they were actively managing the flow of rough diamonds to the market to keep conditions favorable. We expect that re-opening, increased foot traffic and rising retail sales will help diamond prices maintain the strong momentum they experienced during holiday 2020 and into early 2021. We are positive on the diamond mining companies as a combination of attractive valuation and the potential for elevated cash returns to shareholders is likely to draw increasing investor interest, particularly as the environment for Gold prices remains challenging.

As we move into reporting season for the gold miners, we expect strong cash flow generation across much of the sector as margins remain robust even at \$1,700/oz gold. We continue to favor companies with the best combination of near-term growth and strong cash flow as we believe these companies represent the lowest risk and will be best positioned to enhance shareholder returns.

What does the future hold for Gold?

Longer-term, Gold will likely continue to draw support from the accommodative fiscal and monetary environment in place across the globe, though global re-opening and reflation have capped prices for the time being. Without a change to the macroeconomic backdrop, we expect gold prices to remain mostly subdued. We do not anticipate a return to previous highs unless inflation or currency condition change materially.

Sector Performance and Positioning

- During the month of March, the fund gained 0.28% in USD.
- The top 3 individual contributors to the fund were Newmont Corporation, Franco-Nevada Corporation, and Impala Platinum Holdings Limited.
- The top 3 detractors were Pan American Silver Corp., MAG Silver Corp., and Northern Star Resources Ltd.
